Why This Work Matters....

The Early Years Learning Framework

Principle Aboriginal and Zenadth Kes (formerly Torres Strait Islander) perspectives

- Highlights the responsibility we have in creating culturally safe places, working in intercultural ways through slow pedagogy and practice.
- An intercultural space is created when educators seek out ways in which Western and Aboriginal and Zenadth Kes knowledge systems work side by side.


